Nature of Service and Principles to Safeguard Children from Harm

The Irish Red Cross is a registered charity. The vision of the Irish Red Cross is to be a leading humanitarian organisation providing impartial services and support to vulnerable communities both at home and aboard. Our mission is to identify and deliver humanitarian assistance, both at home and abroad, to those who are most in need. In achieving this we will be guided by the fundamental principles of the Red Cross. The Irish Red Cross delivers a range of services across Ireland through its network of volunteers and staff. We engage with children and young people through the services we provide, and through our youth membership structures. Through our programmes and activities children and young people (4-18 years) meet on a weekly basis to learn new skills and engage in personal development programmes. Children from 4-9 years engage in interactive and fun activities to develop their understanding of belonging, feelings, health and hygiene, and First Aid. Our older Red Cross youth take part in fun challenges, youth camps and other activities that develop their leadership skills and promote positive mental health, HIV Awareness, support for the LGBTI+ community, and a humanitarian response towards asylum seekers and refugees. The Irish Red Cross (IRC) is committed to the protection and welfare of the children and young people with whom we work equally, regardless of race, ability, ethnicity, sexuality or

sexual orientation. We are also committed to promoting the rights of children and young people and involving them in decision making, in matters that affect their lives.

Our safeguarding policies and practices are based on the Children First Act 2015, Children First: National Guidance for the Protection and Welfare of Children 2017, the Children Act 2001, and the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child.

The best interests and welfare of the child is the paramount consideration underpinning all IRC interactions and decisions concerning children and young people. Furthermore we adhere to the safeguarding principles that:

- o The safety and welfare of children is everyone's responsibility.
- Children and young people have the right to be heard, listened to and taken seriously. Taking account of their age and understanding, they should be consulted and involved in all matters and decisions that may affect their lives.
- The overall aim in all dealings with children and their families is to intervene proportionately to support families to keep children safe from harm.
- Early intervention is key to getting better outcomes. Where it is necessary for the State to intervene to keep children safe, the minimum intervention necessary should be used and it should build on existing strengths and protective factors in the family.
- A proper balance must be struck between protecting children and respecting the rights of the parents/carers and family. Parents/carers should be consulted and involved in decision about their children, unless to do so would place the child at risk of harm.
- Children should only be removed from their parents/carers when alternative means of protecting them have been exhausted.
- o Child protection is a multiagency, multidisciplinary activity. Agencies and professionals must work together in the interests of the children.

Risk Assessment of Any Potential Risk of Harm

The IRC have carried out a comprehensive assessment of any potential risk of harm (as defined in the Children First Act 2015¹) to a child while availing of our services. The areas of risk and the policies and procedures identified to address them are contained in the table below. This is a live risk assessment and open to change as necessary.

¹ As defined in the Children First Act 2015, harms means 'in relation to a child— (a) assault, ill-treatment or neglect of the child in a manner that seriously affects or is likely to seriously affect the child's health, development or welfare, or (b) sexual abuse of the child, whether caused by a single act, omission or circumstance or a series or combination of acts, omissions or circumstances, or otherwise'.
